About the Statue of Saint Angela

Created by Annette Zobel, Art Department Chair at Ursuline Academy St. Louis, this statue provided inspiration for this year's convocation. Annette shares the following about this sculpture: "My sculpture is inspired by my own deep-felt personal experiences. In that regard, it is, in a manner, also a self-portrait. Obviously not a physical portrait, but it is a look at a more personal internal landscape. My sculpture ranges from light, gestural figures in bronze to more statuesque forms in stone. I simplify the lines and forms to enhance the movement of the figures, and so as not to distract the view from the spiritual and emotional content of the work. I hope that each viewer brings his or her own unique experience to the work, since it is not my experience that is most important, but the human experience and emotion that we all share. We live in a world where we can communicate with others all day and yet never hear the sound of a real voice or experience the touch or smell of another person. I believe that art can help us find connections with others and free us, if only for a moment, from our own isolation."



Sister Teresa Maya is a member of the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word, San Antonio since 1994. Her ministry has been in education. Sister Teresa has served as a teacher, history professor, and administrator. She has a passion for the formation of ministers for Hispanics/Latinos in the United States. Sister Teresa got her B.A. at Yale University, her M.A. at the Graduate Theological Union at Berkeley and a Ph.D. in El Colegio de Mexico in Mexico City. She is currently serving as Congregational Leader for her Congregation and in the presidency for Leadership Conference of Women Religious (LCWR).
